


Life at the University of Auckland

At the University of Auckland you can have the best of both worlds, living in one of the best cities for lifestyle,* and learning at New Zealand’s leading university, ranked among the top 100 worldwide.**



The University of Auckland is New Zealand’s largest and most comprehensive university, known for the excellence of its teaching and research. When planning your Study Abroad experience, you can select from hundreds of course options within the subjects listed in this brochure. Whatever you choose to study, your courses will incorporate the latest research findings and perspectives related to your discipline. Many of our academic staff, including researchers, scholars and creative artists, are at the top of their field, nationally and internationally.

Stretching across 16 hectares in the centre of the city, the University campus is integrated into the heart of city life. Harbour views and nearby parks provide a scenic study setting, just minutes’ walk from the city centre’s shopping and entertainment district. During Orientation Week we host a range of events to help familiarise you with the campus, give you the opportunity to meet other students and experience a traditional Māori pōwhiri (welcome ceremony).

With a population of 1.5 million, 40 percent of whom were born overseas, city life in Auckland is a blend of cultures, cuisines and nature. Auckland has two harbours and 3,700km of coastline, and is the warmest and one of the sunniest of New Zealand’s cities. Naturally, beach activities play a big part in Auckland city life. You can go for a morning surf or kayak before breakfast, swim or relax at a beach between classes, and in the evening take a ferry across to the North Shore to watch the sun set behind the city.

Guaranteed University housing

University accommodation is guaranteed* for Study Abroad and Exchange students, and provides a safe, comfortable and supportive living environment. All University residences are within easy walking distance of the City Campus, as well as many of Auckland’s main attractions.

There are a variety of room options available from NZ\$221-355¹ per week. Our accommodation advisory service can also assist you with information about private accommodation such as shared housing (flattening) or homestays.

Māori and Pacific Studies

Māori Studies will enable you to develop a rich appreciation and knowledge of Māori culture. You can choose from different aspects of Māori Studies to suit your interests and goals. Study opportunities include Māori language, Māori and the media, material culture, history, development, politics, and Māori performing arts (Kapa Haka).

You can also develop your knowledge and awareness of Pacific cultures through Pacific studies. You can explore and compare different Pacific performing arts, languages, cultures, literature, history and linguistics.

Wine Science

Undergraduates can study an introduction to Wine Science with a special emphasis on grape growing and winemaking in New Zealand. A range of options are available at postgraduate level. The New Zealand wine industry is a significant contributor to the New Zealand economy and there are more than 500 wineries across the country. The University of Auckland owns Goldie Vineyard on Waiheke Island, an important winegrowing region of New Zealand located 40 minutes by ferry from downtown Auckland.

Rugby

Be part of the most sophisticated and successful high-performance rugby programme in New Zealand. Under this arrangement you'll enrol in three academic courses at the University



alongside a semester-long workshop at the Auckland Rugby Academy. You'll receive the same specialist coaching in technical and tactical skills, nutrition, and strength and conditioning as Auckland's elite rugby players. This is a rare opportunity for male and female rugby players to gain a uniquely New Zealand sporting experience while also pursuing academic studies.

Short course – Screen Tools

Screen Tools is a hands-on course designed to set you up with the tools you need to launch your career in film, television and digital media industries. Instructed by *The Hobbit* actor John Callen, this course is ideal for students with an interest in filmmaking or scriptwriting. Over four weeks, students on this course work as a production team to produce a serial drama. Field trips to the *Hobbiton* movie set and Weta Workshop design and effects studio are included.

Short course - Drama Tools

Centred around acting and storytelling, Drama Tools is a four-week intensive course that incorporates set design, props, costume, lighting and sound. Taught by experienced director James Wenley, this course is ideal for English, Drama, Creative Writing, Film or Media students looking for a practical study abroad experience. Students will explore devised theatre, emerging as one of the most popular genres of contemporary theatre. Devising is a process in which the entire team collectively develops, then performs the work.



As a Generation Study Abroad commitment partner, the University of Auckland is giving more students the opportunity to study in New Zealand. We've committed 100 Study Abroad scholarships of NZ\$1,275 per year through our partnerships for fee-paying study abroad students. "I'm from the Yurok and Karuk Native American tribes in California. I chose to study abroad at the University of Auckland to see first-hand New Zealand's story with indigenous peoples. I knew of similarities between some Māori and Yurok traditions and wanted to learn more about the culture's history and how Māori are dealing with problems that affect the majority of indigenous people today. One of the courses I chose was "The Māori World".

"A highlight of my time in Auckland was being hosted on a local marae (Māori meeting house) and hearing the stories behind the carvings. I'm particularly interested in the revival of the Māori language, and see parallels between the struggles of Māori and those of my own people to preserve our language. My time in New Zealand has made me even more determined to keep learning the Yurok language.

"I was also attracted to study here because of the cultural diversity on campus, and I wasn't disappointed. In my experience, students at schools in the US are mainly white, but here I've befriended students from China, Italy, Spain, Malaysia, and of course New Zealand."

Tuition fees

Study Abroad students pay a single flat fee, which covers tuition fees for up to four courses, and includes the student services fee. The Study Abroad fee for 2018 is \$12,750 (US\$8,861*) per semester.
